

We'd like to thank Lars Giertz for taking care of the refreshments at last month's meeting and thank Owen Morris for agreeing to take care of them for the July meeting. In case you are not aware of it, Dave Hoffman, the Club Treasurer, reimburses you for the refreshments when you provide a "chit" with the itemized expenses.

The 1/4 scale discussion by 0. G. Morris and Lars Giertz provided the Club members and guests with an excellent exposure to the real-world pleasures and problems associated with the big ones. Owen's 1/4 scale stagger wing Beachcraft was really impressive in size, finish, and every other way imaginable. A double thank you to both Lars and Owen for the fine program.

This month (July), Charlie Palermo will be presenting and discussing his 1/4 scale Fleet Bi-Plane and Tim Brown (our newsletter editor) will be addressing retract types and installation techniques. Sounds like another winner.

At the last meeting, the following by-laws amendment on dues was approved:

"Article 2, Section 3. No initiation fee shall be charged. The annual dues for the Club shall be \$25 for one year which is from January 1 through December 31. Dues for junior members (under 18) shall be \$10 for the same period as above. Club membership dues are waived for a member's spouse who is an AMA member. Persons joining in October, November, or December shall have their membership carried over for the following calendar year. Members renewing their Club and AMA membership before December 1 for the upcoming year will be allowed a 20 percent reduction in dues. The Club FCC license fee shall be included in the annual dues and the license shall be in effect for the time specified by the FCC. The AMA license fees shall correspond to those amounts set by age for junior or senior members. Upon payment of dues and confirmation of AMA membership, the member shall be issued a Club membership card (badge) permitting access to the flying site at JSC."

It was also noted that the quorom definition in the Constitution (to be voted on at the July meeting) would be changed to read:

"The membership present at a regularly scheduled monthly meeting shall constitute a quorom."

This was the best scale "contest" that the club as sponsored in the past 3 years. There were 19 egistered participants and a few others who had odels but didn't register. With multiple entries here were 27 models entered. The quality and iversity of the models was by far the best we ave had at the field and they provided everyone ith a good perspective of the range of interests nat R/C modelers have. The majority of trophies ere keyed to evaluations by the contestants. An kception was a static scale judging by AMA Sport

Scale rules conducted by John Hill and Charles Jackson of the Clear Lake Line Winders and Tim Brown. Contestants flew when they wanted to, so the stress level was very low and left them free to talk to other modelers and spectators and

mare their experiences. Several indicated they e looking forward to next year's MSC/RCC Scale ncontest! So now to the details....

The "Best of Show" award was given to one of o ducted-fans entered -- Hoot Gibson's F-16A. ot's model is 1/10 scale made of fiberglas and oam and is powered by a K&B 6.5 engine driving Scozzi fan. In addition to this award, the ·16A also won best standoff scale as voted by e entrants and also first place in static jud-

ng. The other jet was a 109 powered Heinkel 1-162 "Salamander" ich was successfully own on Sunday.

Second in static scale judging was Hal Rosenrg's PT-17 beautifully finished in Army Air rps trainer colors. Hal's scale presentation very good and after a few details are added corrected, this will be a difficult airplane beat in static scoring!

Third in static scale was Brad Shepherd's very neat model of the French CAP-20. Unfortunately, Brad did not have a photo of

the real aircraft with the same paint scheme as the model, and this hurt his

a Spinks Acromaster, and a Model Merchant's Martin-Baker MB-5. His flying of all three had to be seen to be believed. When he and his old friend Dan Parsons flew their MB-5's together, it was really outstanding! They would come across the field right on the deck in trail formation and perform beautiful maneuvers still in Another outstanding pair of fliers was trail. Vacek and Joe Pasztor from

> Lake Jackson with their P-51 and FW-190 models. You would have thought WW II had broken out all over again to watch them go at it. Most of the maneuvers were started right on the deck, less than 5 feet, and they certainly commanded the attention of everyone!

At the other end of the performance spectrum was Carl White with his \frac{1}{4}-scale C2 Aeronca and Nieuport 11 models.

The Airknocker was powered by an OS60 4-cycle engine that had just the right power and noise to duplicate the full scale airplane's flight It was most graceful, and characteristics. Carl really flew it well!

There were only two bad crashes in both days of flying. One, a P-51, was the result of a high speed stall-spin: the other, a Little Toot bipe, was some kind of radio trouble.




