There were two pylon races during August which MSCRCC Members attended. The first was the Nationals in Dayton, Ohio where Art Arro flew Quarter Midget and Formula 1. Ben Ezra Issac also attended as a mechanic/caller. It was the biggest racing Nats ever with 81 entries in QM and 83 on Formula 1. Art finished 24th in QM and "way Bown" in F-1 due to tank and engine problems. The winner in both events was Dave Pearse from N. Carolina who really had it all together for the week. Local District-8 fliers who did well include; George Parks, 2nd in QM, and Gale Heims, 3rd in QM also. Both are familiar faces in the Dist.8 racing circuit.

Locally, the Houston Area Pylon Racing Association and the Alvin R/C Club hosted a District-8 500 Class (Quickie) Race on August 22, 1976. Sixteen entries showed up to fly six rounds on a beautiful, windless but hot, Sunday afternoon. Seven of these were from the MSCRCC and the included Art Arro, Mel Brewer, Paul Claeys, Dennis Drysdale, Harvey Duck James Raines and J.W. Smith. The first three (3) places along with the Fast Time were captured by MSCRCC members and the box score is listed below:

There were very many close and exciting heats throughout the day and many fliers were knocking 10-20 seconds off their times as the race progressed. Competition leads to improvment. Also note the various desig which flew and no single plane was faster than another in the hands of a competant pilot. Prime example was Paul Claeys who beat all comers including the contraversial HAF-Fast designs with a Skooter II. This particular plane even has wing dowels and rubber bands for hold downs and is rated as one of the slower designs in the District-8 rules. Consistency and piloting skill is the major factor in Quickie racing.

The workers came from the ranks of the Alvin club, the Texas City club and the MSCRCC. All did a outstanding job in the heat of that Sunday afternoon and MSCRCC members to be commended are Robert Besch and Lenny Magill & sons. Thanks to you all again.
