

The 1981 NATS has come and gone in Seguin and New Braunfels, Texas. I wish that all you soaring enthusiasts had joined us there!

Open, standard and modified standard classes were flown on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday with approximately 75 contestants competing. Things got off to a slow start (when is the last time you've been to a contest that didn't?!) because the AMA's batteries arrived at the flying site 2½ hours late. But meanwhile - there were many people to visit with, and many planes to see and to talk about. Each contestant flew three flights a day for three days. The conditions were 8-10 mph winds with a definite lift cycle (big ups and big downs). We had good weather all four days - HOT - but good!

The first place winners were: Open - Tom Jones, the Woodlands, Tx, flying a modified Megan; Standard - John Brown, Ca, flying a two meter Icarus; Modified Standard - Matt Sheldon, Co, flying a Sagitta 900 with rudder and elevator only.

Tom Jones' final flight was sensational! In a desperate search for a 10 minute flight, he flew almost out of sight down and cross wind. He continued that heading in spite of the fact that he didn't have enought altitude to come back. A few minutes into the flight, and about 100' off the ground, he hit a small bump. He managed to climb out and max. That was the most impressive 10 minutes of knee-knocking flying that I've ever seen!

The NASA club was represented by Dick Roddy and myself. Dick, flying his 100" home brew, opted to fly Class A standard without spoilers - since he usually lands short with them. He placed 3rd, missing only one landing because his airplane flipped over. (His body English flipped him over, too!) One landing was a 100 pointer - good show, Dick!!

Flying my Spirit 150 T-tail in open class, I got off to a poor start. I accumulated no maxes and only 34 landing points the first day. Things were bound to improve. With consistent flying and landing, I was able to come back to 5th place. I was thrilled!!

Thursday's 2 meter drew about 45 contestants with Tom Williams of Dallas winning 1st place. He flew a chopped down Windrifter with a thermal sniffer. Scale had 6 entries. Ron Stanfield of Little Rock, Arkansas, won 1st place, flying a Schweizer TG2. It's interesting to note that Ron has a unique launching technique - he launches his TG2 with both hands, and then picks up his transmitter!

Thursday evening there was a banquet and an awards presentation. Official standings will soon be published for all who are interested to read, but a couple of special awards are worthy of note. The first annual Hi Johnson trophy was awarded to John Brown, Ca, for overall performance. Hi was recently killed in a full-size glider accident. Ironically, John Brown was one of his apprentice fliers in RC. Despite the great showing by Texans, the Texas-Florida trophy was carried home by the Floridians again! Cecil Haga of Dallas, who made the presentation, swears that there is something "strange" about the way the scoring is done in that interstate battle!

With the soaring ending on Thursday, we had an opportunity to go to Seguin on Friday and Saturday to witness some of the other events. The AMA showed a great preference for the nonsoaring events - evidenced by: the quality of the flying site, the number of AMA official on hand to help out, the use of computers for scoring, the number of conveniences, like concession stands and port-o-cans. This preference was discussed at the awards banquet Thursday night - with President John Grigg present. Hopefully, this will be remedied by 1982. Despite the inconveniences, Don Chancey of Dallas (C.D.) and his staff put on an excellent event. They worked hard and long to make the event enjoyable for all, and the contestants did an excellent job by pitching in and helping when called upon.
